BACKGROUND

This post is attached to the AHRC-funded research project Queer Cinema from Spain and France: The translation of desire and the formation of transnational queer identities, coordinated at The University of Manchester by Professor Chris Perriam and Dr Darren Waldron.

This project focuses on transnational sexualities and their representation in cinema. It homes in on Spain and France (as sites of production, distribution and reception) and Britain (as a site of distribution and reception), and on lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, and queer films and their audiences/viewers. Building on previous film historical work on the processes of transnationalization of cinema and on recent shifts in thinking about queer cultural identities, the project examines specific cases of the trans-European traffic of films and film makers in the context of the notions of queer culture and queer cinema and in the period 1990 to the present day. It examines: the question of the translatability in images of formations of desire; questions of audience and critical reception and cultural translation in relation to taste, fantasy, desire and values; the relationship between cultural flows and the formation and representation of queer identities in national and transnational contexts.

It seeks to answer the following questions:

- (1) How translatable, through cinematic media, performances, and agencies are patterns and codings of queer desire?
- (2) How do the movement and reception of films and filmmakers across national, cultural and linguistic lines feed into the social construction of non-normative identities? And which structures of taste, pleasure, value, fantasy and desire circulate in these processes?

and includes the following objectives:

- to contribute to the cultural understanding of the mechanisms, strategies and discourses which inform and question the category of queer cinema in transnational contexts, specifically through case studies relating to Spain and France (as sites of production, distribution and reception) and Britain (as a site of distribution and reception)
- to identify the processes by which structures of taste, value, fantasy and desire are produced by the movement of films and filmmakers across cultural, linguistic and national lines

- to make a substantial contribution to audience research through focusing on issues of sexuality, difference and desire from the perspective of queer film history and theory
- to gauge the degree of cultural translatability of patterns of desire and their meanings in film through the application and adaptation of theories of representation, sexuality, power and culture

It seeks not only to probe queer interpretative communities and their interaction with the films as objects of the study, but also to connect with these community elements as actively engaged audiences. Festival-based presentations in France, Spain and Britain will target local audiences in order to further debate within interested collectives on issues of queer identity and citizenship. Interviews with programmers and select audiences of the London LGBT Festivals 2012 and 2013 are planned (and similar activities at Cornerhouse Manchester, which will fall outside the timespan of the appointment). Engagement with local lesbian, gay and queer communities and groups is essential to the project.

JOB DESCRIPTION

Overall, the work involves:

- archival and web-based investigation (including on-line forums and fan sites)
- festival visits;
- film and performance analysis
- the promotion of the project's aims through widespread publicity in the LGBTQ communities in question as well as academic dissemination; and audience research

It engages with media production and its reception across four languages (Spanish, French, Catalan, English) and will recruit its participants across a range of digital and physical audience locations, with a particular emphasis on festivals.

While it is expected that the research team members will each play to their strengths selectively in relation to the activities described here, all will have some active involvement in every aspect of the project. An appropriate and flexible division of labour will be an early and continuing concern of the project management process.

The Research Associate will develop her/his own research trajectory and priorities within the aims and objectives of the project, with guidance from Professor Perriam in the first instance on the overall project, and from Dr Waldron in relation to audience research, as appropriate.

The postholder will be encouraged to engage particularly with transnational and comparative dimensions of the project. S/he will also take a major role in keeping the project linked to unfolding theoretical debates and in collaborating with the two other researchers in the interpretation and dissemination of the results of the project, through journal publications (both joint- and sole-authored; three are envisaged) and conference presentations.

The University of Manchester will offer staff development activity tailored specifically to academics at this stage of their career.
