Job Summary

The University of Birmingham wishes to appoint a Lecturer in Shakespeare and Theatre commencing January 2013. We seek someone who will make an outstanding contribution to the research profile of the College of Arts and Law. The appointed person will be expected to undertake research of an international standard and to contribute to the development of programmes. S/he will be required to contribute substantially to the teaching of the Shakespeare Institute, particularly by offering practice-based classes in theatrical performance. This will include convening programmes that are already running (eg MA Shakespeare and Theatre, MA Shakespeare and Education) and making a major contribution to the new curriculum in Shakespeare and Creativity at MA, MFA and PhD level. The post holder will be expected to support distance learning as well as face to face seminars. Candidates should state their research and teaching expertise clearly on their application.
