Director of the University of Tennessee School of Architecture

The University of Tennessee School of Architecture invites applications for a full-time director position commencing July 1, 2014. The 12-month position brings with it the opportunity to enhance the direction, character, and prestige of an architecture program that will be celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2015.

We seek an energetic, enthusiastic person who is comfortable assuming varied roles within the program, college, and university with a demonstrated capacity to engage and lead an exceptionally talented faculty. We are seeking an individual who embodies the diversity and intercultural goals of the college and university. The program offers a design-centered curriculum that promotes an ethic of critical thinking, cultural stewardship, and environmental, social, and economic sustainability.

The director administers the undergraduate and graduate professional programs and a new research-oriented graduate degree. The position offers a competitive salary and benefits package commensurate with the successful candidate's qualifications and experience, as part of a 12-month appointment at the rank of full professor. As a faculty member, the director is expected to teach. The successful candidate will serve a renewable 5-year appointment as director subject to annual performance reviews from the dean of the College of Architecture and Design.

As the state's flagship, research-intensive institution, the University of Tennessee, Knoxville is among the nation's top public universities. The School of Architecture, established in 1965, has a faculty of diverse educational backgrounds, with national and international recognition in creative activity, research, and teaching. The director administers all degree programs in the school. Degrees offered include a five-year Bachelor of Architecture, a Master of Architecture, and a M.S. in Architecture. Both professional degrees are accredited by the National Architecture Accreditation Board (NAAB).

The director will be expected to foster the school's culture of collaboration with the college's undergraduate program in interior design and graduate program in landscape architecture. The college shares its award-winning building with the School of Art, offering numerous opportunities for cross-disciplinary collaboration. The school's students are among the most highly qualified in the university. Both the faculty and the student body are intensely engaged in international study. For a semester, all undergraduate architecture students are required to study off-campus/abroad.

Required Qualifications:

Candidates must hold at least one of the following: a professional undergraduate degree in architecture and a graduate degree in architecture or a related field; a professional graduate degree in architecture; or a doctoral degree in architecture or a related field. Candidates must be qualified, by education and experience, to administer a professional architecture program. Successful candidates will possess credentials that merit appointment at the rank of full professor. Candidates must demonstrate evidence of leadership and entrepreneurship as well as management skills and the ability to collaborate across disciplines. Candidates will demonstrate a clear understanding of undergraduate and graduate-level design education and show potential for excellence in studio-based design instruction and research/scholarship/creative activity/outreach. All candidates must demonstrate the ability to pursue self-directed intellectual objectives through research, scholarship, creative work, and/or practice.

Preferred Qualifications:

Preferred candidates will possess the credentials, experience, professional and academic networks, and desire necessary to build the national and international reputation of the program. Preference will be given to individuals with demonstrated success with alumni relations and development, student recruiting and retention, and communication with external constituencies. Candidates will exhibit an awareness of

university expectations for tenure and promotion and have qualifications that predict success in the stewardship of candidates for tenure and promotion. Experience in distinguished practice is desirable as is experience guiding multi-disciplinary teams. Preferred candidates will hold a professional license in architecture and/or a Ph.D. or doctorate in architecture or related field.

Preferred candidates for this position will have had experience in academic administration including the evaluation of faculty, the administration of budgets, guiding the curriculum and the accreditation of professional programs.
